A STORM LIKE NO OTHER



Building a Stronger Community

By the time it made landfall in the Philippines, Haiyan was the most powerful typhoon ever recorded, with sustained winds of 195 mph. Alex, age 6, and his family were lucky – they made it to safety before the storm hit. But they returned to a scene of utter devastation.

The storm destroyed Alex's town, his home and his father's boat, leaving Alex's parents, Niño and Merley, without means to provide food and shelter for their family.

Emergency supplies were critical for Alex's family, but they didn't address their long-term needs. Without his boat and any resources for repairs, Niño had lost his livelihood and his family had little chance of recovery. Rather than simply providing short-term relief, Mercy Corps worked with local partners to craft a plan that would help families like Niño's come back better and stronger than ever.

Jump-starting the economy was job one. Families need income and communities need vibrant, growing trade to thrive.

Working with our local bank partner and area merchants, we launched an emergency cash assistance program. Instead of lining up for one-size-fits-all packages of food and household goods, families received funds directly through their mobile phones. This allowed each family to determine how to use the funds most effectively. The result was

thousands of customized recovery plans that directly addressed each family’s needs and skills. Also included in the program was a bank account – an extremely valuable service that few people living on \$2 a day can access. As soon as the funds arrived in their account, Merley and Niño were able to repair their home and get Niño’s boat back in the water.

Mercy Corps also worked to offer long-term financial education to first-time account holders like Merley and Niño. They were introduced to financial services, such as insurance and loans, and shown how to navigate these services to safeguard their assets, rebuild their business and face the future with new strength.

Connecting People to the Resources They Need

In the middle of the night, 9-year-old Amani (wearing bow) arrived on foot at a refugee camp in Jordan. She had just walked 47 miles with her mother and four siblings through incredibly dangerous territory to escape the unfathomable violence consuming her Syrian hometown. Like millions of other refugees fleeing the war in Syria, Amani

and her family escaped with little but the clothes on their backs.

Mercy Corps was there to evaluate immediate needs and deliver urgently needed food and supplies to families and individuals. For anyone struggling with the trauma of war, especially children, these needs go far beyond food and shelter. Nightmares hounded Amani and her siblings, who rarely slept the night without crying. They

That's why we set up children's centers in Amani's camp and others like it, so kids can spend time with trained and trusted adults dedicated to providing gentle, nurturing care. To help children understand their fears and cope with their memories, we offer art and
